Learning Through *Educated*: A Look into the Value of Knowledge via Memoir

Course Description:

Educated by Tara Westover follows the true story of Westover's life in rural Idaho. Growing up with extremely religious and survivalist parents, Westover lacked a birth certificate, friends, and—most relevant to the themes of the memoir—a formal education. The memoir follows Westover's journey seeking both knowledge and herself over decades, allowing the reader to ponder the value of learning and how to come to terms with who we truly are. Throughout this course, we will focus on these themes as well as themes of human connection, familial duties, and open-mindedness via class wide discussions and journal entries. Experiencing through Westover the importance of education will allow the class to reflect on what education means to them and help foster gratitude for learning and knowledge. Taking this course will allow students to feel inspired by Westover's story and reflect on the true value of education and human connections. These reflections will be made deeper through weekly journal entries regarding the chapters read that week as well as class discussion about the events and themes of the memoir. Along with discussion of themes and plot, we will analyze people within the memoir and their significance in guiding the plot of the memoir forward. Students will gain the opportunity to read

a story not generally taught in schools and understand its relevance to both current world events and their own personal values and experiences.

Course Objectives:

Students will analyze the themes of education, self-discovery, and human connection in *Educated* through journaling and class discussions. Students will also evaluate the role of familial relationships and societal expectations in shaping identity and personal growth through the discussions within this course. Lastly, students will develop a deeper appreciation for the value of education and its power by connecting Westover's experiences to their own perspectives on learning and knowledge.

Required Textbooks:

Educated by Tara Westover – Hardcover, paperback, Kindle, audiobook, pdf, etc. Also available on loan through the Alachua County Public Library, but please note that you will need access to the book throughout the entire semester.

Weekly Journal Entries:

As we read the memoir, there will be weekly journal entries assigned to assess your comprehension and thoughts on the selected chapter(s) for the week. This will be a Canvas assignment with a text box or photo submission. Journal entries are expected to be used as a method of recording your reactions, thoughts, and emotions while reading the chapters and must include a question that you had while reading. They must be a minimum of 200 words and should analyze themes of the memoir that may be discussed in class.

Attendance and Class Expectations:

Attendance is mandatory. If you are unable to attend class for any reason, please email me or tell me in person and we will discuss options of making up that week's discussion points. Additionally, requirements for class attendance and make-up exams, assignments, and other work in the course are consistent with university policies. It is expected that you participate in discussions each week. As long as each student participates in the discussion at least once, they will receive full points. If you are not feeling well or have a personal reason why you do not feel comfortable speaking in class that week, please let me know.

Final Assignment:

The final assignment is a creative response to the book. Students will create a blog, 2-D art piece, 3-D art piece, poem, or short story representing how you would feel and what you would do if

you were raised in Tara's situation—no formal education, mistreatment from your family members, few social interactions outside of your family, and limited access to medical care. Further requirements for the project will be found in Canvas toward the end of the semester.
