Dear listeners,

Welcome and thank you for signing up for this class! Please call us Melina and Lexi.

Are you ready for it? In this class, students will fearlessly jump then fall into 13 gorgeous weeks of discussing Taylor Swift's discography, with a focus on her evergreen songwriting, and use Swift's enchanting lyrics to inform their art in the form of paintings, photographs, and more. Each week, students will be expected to keep their eyes open and examine closely in order to listen, discuss, reflect, argue, and write on various themes. Students will collaborate with their peers to annotate lyrics, analyze themes, and participate in class discussions. Students will participate in thematic assignments which include identifying inspirational artwork in Gainesville, creating their own artwork, and collaborating on a final group project. As we go through the course, we encourage you to think critically about the texts and the topics we encounter and to push your creativity. Achievement of the learning outcomes will be assessed through engagement in the playlist annotations, class discussions, your artwork, and the final group project.

If you are struggling with this course, with your other courses, or with life outside of the University, we invite you to talk to us or someone that you trust. Whether this is your first, last, or somewhere in-between year at UF, college life can be challenging and sometimes overwhelming. Just talking about those feelings can help. If just talking with your family, your friends, or your instructors isn't enough, there is a list of campus resources on Canvas to help you. We are happy to help you understand how these can be helpful for you.

You never owe Melina nor Lexi personal information about your mental or physical health. However, you are always welcome to talk to us about whatever you're going through. If you tell us that you're having trouble, we're not going to judge you or think less of you. If you need extra help or if you need to miss a class or need more time with an assignment, please ask We will work with you to make sure you have the opportunity to engage with the material you may miss because of an illness or other life issues.

#### **Course Goals**

In this course, students will

- identify and explain key themes in select songs from Taylor Swift's musical catalog
- discuss and analyze their perspectives in writing, and in small-group and whole class settings
- create artwork that reflect the themes and the artist's personal connections
- collaborate with peers on a final project

### **Introduction Post**

You will introduce yourself to your peers. You will also go out into the community and find art that inspires you.

### **Annotations and Class Discussions**

The class will cover 4 major themes. Each theme spans two or three weeks. Throughout the modules you will listen to two required playlists of 6 songs each (about 30 minutes), annotate at least 3 songs on Perusall and respond to at least 2 peer comments by Tuesday night. Two of the weeks, we will bring in artwork that ties into the themes so we can discuss the strategies that the artists used and how you can apply similar strategies in your own work.

Attendance and participation are required for class on Wednesdays, since this is a discussion-based class. We will discuss the playlists, your annotations, and the artwork.

The last Wednesday of each module will be dedicated to your artwork: painting, collage, photography, and video creation. Your artwork will reflect that module's general theme and the themes you found while annotating and discussing. Your artwork and an accompanying artist statement will be due by the end of the week. You are also encouraged to start your piece before class if you need more time.

To encourage critical thinking about the themes in the playlists and how they connect with the world and with your art, we will be pushing you to ask deep questions, reflect on your experiences, give your peers constructive feedback, and disagree using your interpretations or experiences. We also ask for respectful and thoughtful engagement as they will lead to better understandings of the music and of each other. A response that consists of, "You wrote ... I agree! Your response is great!" won't be enough.

### **Final Group Project**

We will be working in small groups to prepare for Taylor's next tour. This will entail choosing 40-45 songs for the lineup and creating promotional materials such as the overall visual branding with official tour poster, social media posts, digital ads, merchandise, and the corporate sponsors.

#### Reflection

Your final assignment will be a reflection on the themes that stood out to you and how those themes informed both your critical understanding of the chosen discography and the art you created this semester.
